Ibis

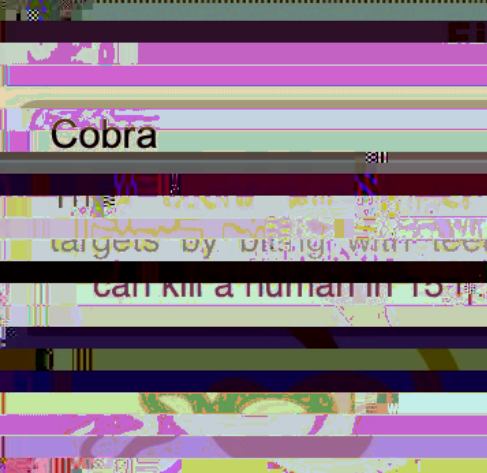
The ibis is a group of long-legged birds. They like to live in swampy places. Ibis all have long bills which they can use them to find small fish, and worms from the ground.

Find me at Petrie Museum case 1513

Limestone fragment
Heracles standing on 2 crocodiles. Heracles is
important in Ancient Egypt as he was said to
bring things including the crocodile to Egypt.



Find me at Petrie Museum case 1513

This archaeological artifact was found by the
British Egyptologist Flinders Petrie in the Nubian
desert in 1892. It is a limestone fragment
depicting Heracles standing on two crocodiles.
Heracles is a Greek god, and the crocodiles
are said to represent the crocodiles of Egypt.

Saqqara
It is a limestone fragment with a head of
an ibis. The ibis curved beak is like a
crescent moon. The Egyptians
believed that ibis represented the life god
of the moon.



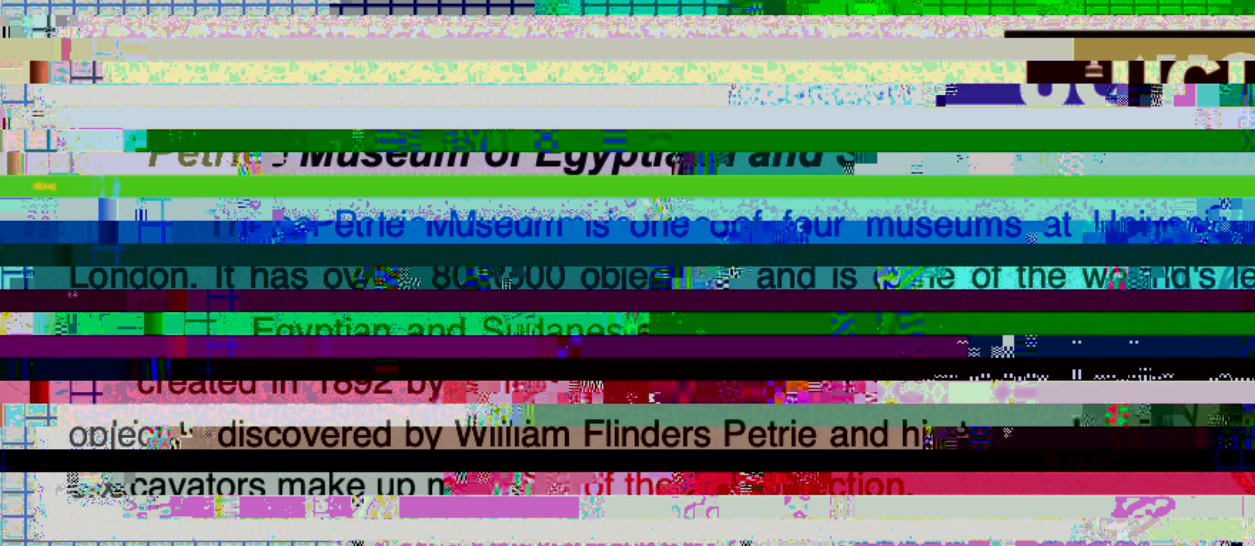

Petrie Museum of Egyptian and Sudanese Antiquities

The Petrie Museum is one of four museums at UCL in
London. It has over 80,000 objects and is one of the world's largest
collections of Egyptian and Sudanese antiquities.
The museum was created in 1892 by Flinders Petrie and his
colleagues. The objects discovered by William Flinders Petrie and his
colleagues make up nearly 80% of the collection.
